

MCCG is committed to providing the latest medical technology and facilities to address the healthcare needs of Central Georgians. However, state-of-the-art technology is useless without the expertise of well-trained and highly motivated physicians, nurses, and support personnel. Fortunately, the 543 physicians on the Medical Staff are well-equipped to provide world class care to all of Central Georgia and beyond. These dedicated professionals deliver quality medical care to the citizens of Bibb and surrounding counties regardless of their economic status.

By partnering with Mercer University School of Medicine, MCCG assumes the role of a teaching hospital. Medical students and resident physicians work closely with the medical school faculty as well as private physicians. These doctors-in-the-making participate in a learning experience that is second to none. During their training, they are exposed to the latest in diagnostic technology and treatment modalities. These newly trained physicians are then able to provide the highest quality healthcare for their respective communities.



"Within six weeks of my surgery, I was back in the air!"

When John Timms was told he needed prostate cancer surgery, a thousand questions ran through his mind. "I was scared," recalls John. "The staff and physicians at The Medical Center of Central Georgia told me everything that was going to happen and what I should expect." Timms' surgery would be performed by a surgeon using the da Vinci ® Surgical System robotic system at The Medical Center. With now more than 100 procedures in its first year, the da Vinci ® robotic system allows trained surgeons to operate with smaller instruments, and more precision resulting in less recovery time for the patient. "Within six weeks of my prostate cancer surgery, I took my FAA Flight Physical and passed!" says John. "This is one of the advantages of The Medical Center; they have the equipment to do the job and the people qualified to use that equipment. It gives you all kinds of peace of mind to know you are being cared for by the best."



Providing high quality healthcare is the

foundation for MCCG's mission. By investing in the newest, safest, and most innovative technology, we can improve the health and lives of patients in our region. Investing in your health and preparing for the future, MCCG acquired the following technology in 2008:

- The *da Vinci* ® Surgical System was brought to Central Georgia to assist our surgeons to perform cutting-edge minimally invasive surgery for urology, heart, and gynecological services. The *da Vinci* ® Surgical System has radically enhanced the surgeon's ability to perform prostatectomies, kidney procedures, and hysterectomies while delicately protecting the surrounding tissue and nerves. The smaller robotic arms become an extension of the skilled surgeon's hands and allow the surgeon to access more areas and to manipulate the arms in ways that human hands cannot.
- Orthopedic Trauma Program—supports our Level One Trauma Center by creating a dedicated operating room and providing specialized orthopedic equipment to treat orthopedic trauma patients.
- IE 33 Echo System—provides high quality of 3D images which allow cardiologists to determine the extent of medical issues and to better determine a course of treatment.
- **Nuclear Medicine System**—includes Cardiac Nuclear Imaging to screen for blockages in the heart arteries that might lead to heart attack.
- **Pediatric Intermediate Care Unit**—This six-bed step-down unit will allow us to meet the needs of our pediatric patients who have moved out of intensive care, but are not ready for the general pediatric rooms.

On July 21, 2007, Lamar and Vickie Fortson of Lizella, Ga. were traveling with their family when the unthinkable happened. A tractor-trailer hit their vehicle causing the car to flip several times. The entire family was ejected from the vehicle. Tragically, the accident was so severe, Vickie Fortson, the mother of five, and her youngest daughter, Tamara, did not survive.

The rest of the family was badly injured. Ariel, the oldest of the Fortson children, had the most severe injuries and was rushed to The Children's Hospital at The Medical Center of Central Georgia. Ariel had suffered a massive head injury, fractured bones, severe abrasions all over her body, and a punctured lung. Thanks to the talent and special care of doctors, nurses and staff Ariel made a remarkable recovery and was discharged from the hospital and into rehab less than a month after the accident. Since her hospitalization, Ariel, now 11, has formed lasting friendships with staff at The Children's Hospital and they encourage her to have "girl power," a motto that has helped her through some tough times. Ariel, a student at First Presbyterian Day School, is now able to participate in cheerleading and gymnastics. She loves to read, write, cook and design clothes and jewelry.





"As a first responder, I never imagined I would become the victim."

As Denise Jones consoled a co-worker who had witnessed a terrible car accident on the way to work, she had no idea the victims of the accident were her own family. The shaken co-worker described a gruesome scene; a father and daughter with injuries so severe, there was no way they could have survived. Denise offered a quiet prayer as she heard the wail of the ambulances pass by her office on their way to The Medical Center of Central Georgia, thankful that there was a hospital so close by to care for these victims. Then her cell phone rang.


Brian T. Jones and his two daughters Brianna, 6, and Brittany, 9, were on their way home from McDonald's on Eisenhower Parkway, when their car was broadsided. First responders on the scene found Brian and Brittany thrown from the car and lying in a ditch. Brian, a firefighter from Warner Robins, suffered severe head and neck trauma and had lost a great deal of blood. Brittany had cuts so deep that her arm and leg were nearly severed. Young Brianna, who had only minor injuries, was able to give the EMTs her mother's cell phone number.

Denise, after answering the call from the hospital, raced into the Emergency Center of The Medical Center. She first saw Brianna in the arms of a fireman. Denise was told that both her husband, Brian, and her daughter, Brittany, had life-threatening injuries—the outlook was poor. The nurses and staff lead Denise back and forth from the adult side of the Emergency Center where Brian was being stabilized to the Pediatric side where Brittany was being treated. The physicians and staff worked diligently, applying all of their resources and knowledge, to treat Brian and Brittany, both of whom were in for the fight of their lives.

After six days in ICU, Brian was transferred to a rehab center where he began the long journey of recovery. Brian, who had been a first responder to countless accidents over the years, was now the victim himself. "I have helped send so many injured parties to the Trauma Center at The Medical Center of Central Georgia, knowing they could get the trauma care they needed. I am so grateful that The Medical Center was there for me and my family," says Brian. After extensive surgeries and months in rehab, Brian has returned to full duty at the fire station. "I thank God for my life, for my family and for the ability to help others through my work. Having a Level One Trauma Center right here in Central Georgia, saved my life, my daughter's life, and is an invaluable benefit to everyone in our community."

Brittany has had eight surgeries to repair the damage to her leg and arm. She spent months at The Children's Hospital recovering from her injuries. Now 11, Brittany, one of the fastest runners on her softball team, has just joined the cheerleading squad at Rutland Middle School."The nurses and staff at the Emergency Center saved my life. I don't remember everything about that night, but I knew I was being taken care of," recalls Brittany.

Denise and Brianna became regulars at The Children's Hospital, with the nurses and staff even helping Brianna with her homework. "The night of the accident turned my world upside down," recalls Denise. "The physicians and staff of the Emergency Center kept me informed on both Brian and Brittany and helped me tend to them both throughout those terrifying



hours. I know, without any doubt, that because of the trauma care at The Medical Center, my family is here with me today. The Medical Center of Central Georgia brought my husband and my little girl back to me."

Every hour of every day, the Trauma Team of the Level One Trauma Center of The Medical Center of Central Georgia stands ready to respond when you need us most. Our Trauma Program provides surgeons, surgical specialists, nurses, and many other healthcare professionals to give immediate care to trauma patients with severe, potentially life-threatening or disabling injuries. The Trauma Service is supported by emergency medicine physicians and anesthesiologists, as well as specialists such as neurosurgeons and orthopedic surgeons. Crucial support services such as the blood bank, laboratory services and diagnostic radiology are part of the 24/7 trauma care team. In that critical hour following an injury, MCCG provides state-of-the-art equipment and highly skilled staff to resuscitate, stabilize, and support the most critically injured patient.

With the support of Mercer University School of Medicine Department of Surgery and the Trauma Program, our directors serve on multiple committees throughout the state, providing leadership in research, education, and trauma system planning.

Central Georgia Rehabilitation Hospital Central Georgia Health System

Last year, physical therapist Diane Brown began having severe headaches. She went to her doctor, but the headaches persisted. One day, the pain and symptoms became so severe, Diane's family rushed her to The Medical Center of Central Georgia. Diane had suffered a stroke. After 20 years of helping others overcome physical challenges, Diane now faced her own journey to recovery. After her surgery, Diane was transferred to The Central Georgia Rehabilitation Hospital on Northside Drive in Macon. Surrounded by her co-workers, Diane became, "the worst of patients," joked one therapist. Diane admits she was difficult, frustrated with her physical and speech limitations. The staff at CGRH never gave up—and neither did Diane. After just two months, Diane regained her ability to walk and speak. "The therapists at CGRH gave me my confidence back. That was the biggest challenge of all for me," recalls Diane. "I just didn't trust my body anymore." Within six months, Diane was back at work helping others regain their confidence while also sharing her own story of success.

Stroke: the very word strikes fear in the hearts and minds of us all, knowing that suffering a stroke can change one's life forever. Thankfully, Central Georgia Rehabilitation Hospital, with a free-standing inpatient and outpatient facility, has an experienced and caring staff who has helped more than 30,000 patients regain their confidence and return to their homes.

Created for the sole purpose of rehabilitation, CGRH was designed with our patients in mind. The entire hospital is on one level, including parking, courtyards, dining room, therapy gyms and patient rooms. This 58-bed hospital includes a specialty Neuro Unit and serves patients recovering from strokes, brain injuries, spinal cord injuries and other Neuro-muscular conditions. As part of our continuum of care, stroke victims are cared for by specially trained rehab physicians and staff who oversee all aspects of their recovery. CGRH also offers the area's most specialized technology for stroke rehab including VitalStim Therapy, the Bioness L300 for ambulation, Wii TV for therapeutic rehabilitation, and a comprehensive aquatic treatment setting. CGRH's primary goal is to help patients regain their strength and ability to carry out activities of daily living.



It was a beautiful spring day when Dr. Stuart Slappey, a 31-year-old veterinarian in Perry began working on his tractor. Dr. Slappey thought he had shocked himself when his right hand suddenly went numb. He stood there frozen as his wife, Jenny, a registered nurse, came up to ask him a question. "I thought he was kidding at first," recalls Jenny. "But then I realized he was not responding to my questions." As Dr. Slappey slumped onto the bucket of the tractor, Jenny noticed the right side of his face had begun to droop. As a nurse, Jenny knew she had to "Act F.A.S.T." "There was no question in my mind where we needed to go," said Jenny. "I had the ambulance take us directly to The Medical Center of Central Georgia." Even though other hospitals were closer, Jenny knew that they could only stabilize her husband and then transfer him to MCCG. "I did not want to lose a second," recalls Jenny. From his fog-like state, Dr. Slappey watched as The Georgia Neuro Center team went into action. "Within ten minutes of our arrival at the hospital, I was having a CT scan," recalls Dr. Slappey. Thanks to the guick actions of his wife, the highly trained Neuro team, and emergency services, Dr. Slappey returned to work just three weeks after his stroke. "After several tests, doctors discovered a hole inside my heart which interfered with the blood flow and resulted in a clot that traveled to my brain," explains Dr. Slappey. "My whole life, I've played sports, been very active and never knew there was this time bomb inside of me. Every day, every single day, I am grateful to The Georgia Neuro Center at The Medical Center for having the staff, the training and the technology to help save my life."

Each year, more than 750,000 people suffer a stroke in the United States. When a stroke occurs, time becomes critical—every second counts. The Georgia Neuro Center at The Medical Center of Central Georgia (MCCG) has invested in a significant public awareness campaign to help educate our community on how to recognize and react to the signs and symptoms of a stroke. Teaching the public to recognize the signs of a stroke and to get help quickly is helping to reduce the number of stroke fatalities in our region. When the stroke patient arrives at MCCG, a team of specially trained physicians, nurses and staff of The Georgia Neuro Center (GNC) take quick action to intervene and help reduce the long-term damages caused by the stroke. Recognized nationally as a primary stroke center by the Joint Commission, patients at The Georgia Neuro Center can expect to receive increased specialized care and improved long-term outcomes.



Cancer Diagnosis and Treatment

As your partner in health, the Cancer Life Center of The Medical Center of Central Georgia is dedicated to help prevent, detect, and treat cancer, as well as conduct research and track cancer trends in Central Georgia. The Cancer Life Center of The Medical Center partners with physicians in clinical trials and research studies to test new treatments for people with cancer, in an effort to find better ways to treat cancer patients. Clinical trials test many types of treatment such as new drugs, new approaches to surgery or radiation therapy, new combinations of treatments and new methods such as gene therapy. In addition to research, the Cancer Life Center promotes quality care for their patients through the collection of data regarding diagnosis and treatment of cancer. The de-identified information is compiled and submitted to state and national databases to help provide better care for current and future patients.

"I decided right away to have my baby at The Family Birth Center of The Medical Center of Central Georgia. My husband and I have taken English classes, but translating was the last thing we wanted to worry about during the birth of our baby. Having an interpreter speaking in our first language, made me less afraid. I felt cared for." Today, young Daniella is a bright, healthy child who loves to play at the park. "I would recommend MCCG to all mothers," says Yolanda.

In 2008, The Family Birth Center at The Medical Center of Central Georgia helped to welcome more than 3,300 babies and cared for more than 800 critical newborns in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. MCCG is one of six state-designated Level III perinatal centers in Georgia and the only Level III in our 29-county area. For families, this means that we have the trained personnel and patient services to care for the most critical newborns. Expectant mothers choose The Family Birth Center for their special occasion because of the highly specialized neonatal care available at The Medical Center of Central Georgia, allowing new mothers and their families to rest and enjoy the birth experience.

Medcen Community Health Foundation, established in 1973, is the philanthropic arm of The Medical Center of Central Georgia. Tax deductible gifts through the Foundation help support capital projects as well as outreach projects which enhance the health status of our community.

Our *Generation to Generation* campaign addresses the needs of patients and families through the continuum of health care services from the beginning of life until the final days. The campaign included funds for The Children's Hospital's expansion of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) from 36 beds to 42, and the establishment of a Pediatric Intermediate Care Unit, increasing the scope of services and adding needed capacity. Focused on underwriting projects to enhance the pediatric surgery and emergency center areas of The Children's Hospital, the investment includes the recent purchase of a new, specially equipped, ambulance for neonate/pediatric transport. In addition, funds have been raised for a critically needed inpatient Hospice Home. Thanks to the efforts of the Foundation, the Medcen Board, the Hospice Advisory Board, and countless volunteers, most of the funds are in hand, and plans are well underway to begin construction on the property located on Peake Road.

In 2008, the Foundation also funded health-related projects and grants in the community through HEAT, the employee giving program, as well as collaborating with the Mercer University School of Medicine to fund five promising research projects. The Foundation is proud to partner with The Medical Center as it continues to excel in providing high quality accessible health care and community involvement.

Community Health

The W.T. Anderson Health Center (WTA) has a long history of community service and commitment to community health. Created in 1916 as an outpatient clinic of The Macon Hospital, WTA has grown with and into an essential component of The Medical Center of Central Georgia, enhancing the health status of those served. With nearly 20,000 visits each year, charges are based upon a sliding fee scale determined by financial eligibility criteria.

The W.T. Anderson Health Center provides quality healthcare and health education for Central Georgia residents. In addition, it is a source of outpatient clinical experience for medical residents of The Medical Center of Central Georgia/Mercer University School of Medicine and other health professionals.

The W.T. Anderson Health Center provides primary care and specialty care through 19 multidisciplinary clinics, including orthopedics, high risk obstetrics, cardiology, rheumatology, nephrology, endocrinology, surgery and oncology.


